

0&M Best Practices

Operations and maintenance recommendations that can lower maintenance costs

Intent



Keep your residents and your maintenance staff apprised of conservation activities in your building and on your block.

Information & Tips

The purpose of Integrated Pest Management is to reduce the use of toxic pesticides whenever possible by blocking up openings in walls and floors and using safer pesticides such as pheromones. http:// www.epa.gov/pesticides/factsheets/ipm.htm

Don't let the trash and recycling pile up in garbage rooms, basements or on the street. Find out when your waste and recycling collection days are by inserting your address into the NYC Sanitation website: http://gis.nvc.gov/gisapp/sn/sanitation.isp

Request free posters from the Department of Sanitation, such as recycling posters and pickup schedules. Post the recycling and garbage pickup schedule on every floor where the residents dispose of their waste.

The best way to prevent mold growth in your apartment is to control moisture. Ventilate the bathroom while showering, and the kitchen while cooking. Laundry rooms must be ventilated adequately. Learn more at EPA's site: http://www.epa.gov/mold/moldguide.html

Recommendations for renovating and rehabilitating your building

Intent

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Recycling & **Managing Waste**

Reduce garbage in your building why pay for waste?

Intent



This card will help you learn how to manage your building's waste and recycling program. To make recycling work in your building, supply recycling bins for the building, and place them conveniently next to the trash receptacles.

Green walls are gorgeous vegetated walls that absorb rainwater, and shade and cool your building in the summer, reducing energy use for air conditioning. Green walls also deter graffiti, and help filter air pollution.
